Description:

Hemmingway Editor is a free website that helps you edit your text to a desired level of complexity.

It works both ways, to simplify a piece of writing to an easier level or to elevate a text with suggestion of synonyms, and more.

Accessible for:

- Students with specific learning disorders such as dyslexia or dyspraxia,
- Students with intellectual disabilities,
- Students who required simplified versions of information.

Practical Ideas:

- Use Hemmingway Editor to adapt your reading material to students with reading problems, by deleting passive voices, unnecessary adverbs or complex sentences.
- Proofread your texts and other instructions.
- Adjust the level of a text to younger learners.



HOW TO USE?

Hemminway Editor is an easy to use tool. It allows you to check your spelling, grammar and language level to ensure that your content is accessible to your learners.

Step 1.

On the right is the main page of Hemmingway app.

You can delete the text, and copy/paste your own, or directly write in the software.

Hemingway App makes your writing bold and clear. The app highlights lengthy, complex sentences and common errors; if you see a yellow sentence, shorten or split it. If you see a red highlight, your sentence is so dense and complicated that your readers will get lost trying to follow its meandering, splitting logic—try editing this sentence to remove the red. You can utilize a shorter word in place of a purple one. Mouse over them for hints. Adverbs and weakening phrases are helpfully shown in blue. Get rid of them and pick words with force, perhaps. Phrases in green have been marked to show passive voice. You can format your text with the toolbar. Paste in something you're working on and edit away. Or, click the Write button and compose something new.

Step 2.

The colour codes help you adjust your settings depending on your student's level.

These standards are in accordance with the 'Easy to Read and Understand" framework of inclusion Europe (see Practical Sheet 4).

2 adverbs, meeting the goal of 2 or fewer. 1 use of passive voice, meeting the goal of 2 or fewer. 1 phrase has a simpler alternative. 1 of 11 sentences is hard to read. 1 of 11 sentences is very hard to read.

Step 3.

Lastly, you will get a 'readability grade' based on your text level.

These grades are based on an analysis of education's level for an Average American.

More accessible texts are usually between grade 4-6.
